Spring Clean Your Car: tips to get your car in great condition

For some, spring cleaning is a time-honored ritual, which doesn't just apply to your house. Remember that your car is likely in desperate need of some attention after the winter months.

"A car that's well-maintained is safer, cheaper to run, more reliable and can be worth more money at resale time," says Brian Moody, executive editor of Autotrader.

To help, Autotrader editors are sharing "Simple Spring Car Care" tips to get your car in tip-top shape for the busy driving season ahead:

- Wash and wax your car thoroughly. If you can afford it, have it professionally detailed. However, if you do it yourself, be sure to use a pressure nozzle in order to rid your car of any leftover road salt or sand from the winter. Direct sunlight can cause a car's finish to become

dull, but a thorough washing and waxing can also help keep your car's paint and clear coat looking good.

It's tempting to run the car through an automated car wash, but those big revolving brushes can dull the finish over time. If you're not allowed to wash your car at home due to regional laws or neighborhood rules, seek out a good drive-thru wash and hand wax instead.

- Check and set your car's tire pressure to the level specified in your owner's manual or on the driver's door sill. As temperatures warm up, the air in your tires can expand and that might impact the way the car handles.

Be sure not to over-inflate the tires. While low tire pressure can cause the tire to heat up if it's not rolling down the road properly, extreme over

inflation can cause a blow-out in high temperatures. If you're not comfortable doing this yourself, take your car to a shop for help.

- Have a qualified mechanic do a visual inspection under the hood. If you're comfortable doing this yourself, check for worn belts or hoses and make sure your coolant (sometimes called anti-freeze) isn't too old. Coolant lasts a long time, but keeping track of when it was last changed, especially in older cars, can help you avoid overheating as the temperatures gradually climb.

Jump it the right way

It's happened to you once or twice. You slide into your car, put the key into the ignition and turn it, only to discover that your battery is dead and you're not going anywhere. Your first thought-ask someone for a jump. Lucky for you, you have a set of jumper cables and you know how to use them. Not everyone is as fortunate as you.

Jumping a car battery is a common occurrence, but surprisingly a lot of drivers don't know how to hook up jumper cables or do it wrong, resulting in a flurry of sparks which can lead to an explosion of hydrogen gas from the battery, or worse, damage to the electronic components. Before attempting to charge a battery, drivers should make sure they know what they are doing.

Hooking up jumper cables

is a fairly easy task. To do it safely, drivers should follow these instructions:

1. Position the vehicles so that they don't touch each other. This will prevent a ground connection between the two.

2. Turn off the lights, heater fan and other electrical accessories to both vehicles.

3. Connect one end of the red jumper cable to the positive terminal on the battery of the booster vehicle and the other end to the positive terminal on the dead battery.

4. Connect one end of the black jumper cable to the negative terminal on the battery of the booster vehicle and the other end to a vehicle ground, such as the engine-lifting eye.

5. Start the engine of the booster vehicle and let it idle.

6. Start the engine of the vehicle being jumped.

7. Once the engine of the vehicle being jumped starts, disconnect the negative jumper cable of the jumped vehicle from its ground connection. Then disconnect the black cable from the negative terminal of the battery of the booster vehicle.

8. Disconnect the red cables from the positive terminals of the batteries of both vehicles.

Should the jumped vehicle not start, the driver may need a new battery or have some other problem. In this case, it is best to call a towing service and make an appointment with a mechanic.

Because they never know when they might need to jump-start a battery, all drivers should purchase a set of jumper cables and know how to use them. Experts advise drivers to buy the best quality of cables they can afford and make sure the clamps are well insulated and the wire is at least eight gauge. Lighter gauge wires may not have the ability to deliver the current needed and could in fact melt in the driver's hands.

Jump-starting a battery does not always work. Sometimes you just need a new battery. That's why it's important for you to have your battery checked periodically. That way, you can avoid being stranded with a dead battery.

Don't fear the check engine light

(NAPS)—Although the check engine light may look scary lit up on the dashboard, you don't need to panic. A glowing check engine light doesn't mean you have to immediately pull the car to the side of the road; it does mean you should get the car checked out as soon as possible.

"Motorists should not get spooked when the check engine light comes on," says Rich White, executive director, Car Care Council, the source for the "Be Car Care Aware" campaign promoting regular vehicle care, maintenance and repair. "When illuminated,

the check engine light usually means that a vehicle system, such as the ignition, fuel injection or emission control, is not operating properly."

Possible Problems

Some common malfunctions that can cause the light to illuminate include a faulty oxygen sensor, mass air flow

sensor, or spark plugs and wires. If the light flashes, the condition is more critical and must be checked immediately to prevent severe damage, which may include catalytic converter problems.

"Even if the vehicle appears to be running normally, ignoring the warning light could result in more costly repairs," adds White. "At the very least, the light could be alerting you to an engine problem that is negatively impacting fuel economy and costing you money."

Service and Solutions


When scheduling service, make sure the repair shop that examines your vehicle has professional technicians who are trained and certified in OBDII diagnosis and repair. The technician will connect your vehicle's computer system to a diagnostic scan tool, which will provide trouble codes indicating why the check engine light was activated. While the diagnostic tool is connected,

the technician can analyze data streams such as the idle speed, throttle response, engine temperature, fuel system pressure, manifold vacuum, exhaust emission levels and many other key indicators. Once the problem

is identified and the repair is made, the car's computer is reset.

Trade-in time

When it comes time to buy a new car, some people sell their old one while others use it for a trade-in. While selling usually brings the best price, trading in a vehicle is a lot less hassle. The dealership usually handles all of the paperwork for the trade-in, and all you have to do is sign on the dotted line. Protect your investment

Whether new or used, a vehicle is a big investment. Most people cannot afford to pay for a car outright and must make payments on it instead, usually for three to five years. Keeps the bugs out of the eyes

You're driving along the highway when a rock flips up and hits your windshield. You notice a chip where the rock hit when you get home. You could just leave it and hope it doesn't spread, which is likely to happen in cold weather, or you could replace it, a costly option. Leaving it as is may not even be an option depending upon the state you live in. Some states issue tickets or fines to anyone with a broken or cracked windshield. To find out the laws in your state, contact your local police department or state department of motor vehicles. The other option you have is to repair the damaged windshield. This will save you money and time and keep the original factory seal of the windshield intact.

Not all types of glass can be replaced. Tempered glass can't be repaired, whereas laminated safety glass can be. Bull's-eye, combination and star breaks and edge cracks are among the easiest to repair. Regardless of the type of damage, the repair should be made quickly before contamination from road grime or weather may occur. A repair kit will work for cracks that have penetrated the outer

layer of the windshield. It will not work for cracks that go all the way through the windshield or for radiating cracks. In order to determine how deep the crack is, run your fingernail along the inside surface of the windshield. If you don't feel anything, the crack has not penetrated the windshield and you can repair it yourself.

Thanks to the many kinds of windshield replacement and repair kits available, you no longer have to seek out a professional to fix your window. Some kits contain a windshield resin, a heat lamp to cure the resin, a bracket with a built-in suction cup, a battery-powered drill, a mirror, a pit, drill bits, a polishing wheel and compound, a glass pick, assorted seals and video instructions on how to use the kit. Regardless of the kit you use, keep in mind that you won't be able to drive your vehicle right away. The compound must have time to set, which can run anywhere from an hour to a day depending on the type used.

Most kits are compact and lightweight, allowing you to take them anywhere, as well as reusable, allowing you to make multiple repairs. If at all possible, you should prac-

tice on an old windshield, which you can find at a scrap yard. Choose a sunny day to do the repair. Make it in the shade and then move the vehicle into the sun to help the resin harden.

Make sure the crack is clean and dry before you start applying the resin. If the resin can't penetrate the crack, you will need to use a diamond drill bit (1/32) to insert a small hole into the chip. Using a regular drill bit will ruin the windshield. Drill slowly and not more than half the glass' thickness.

Assemble the kit's bridge, with the injector protruding about 1/8th an inch. Make sure the injector bridge is lined up directly over the pinhole in the middle of the damaged spot. There should

be a tight fit between the O-ring and the windshield's surface.

Put the resin into the injector and screw injector one into injector two. This action will force the resin into the damaged spot. Make sure the resin flows into all of the damaged area. If you need

more resin, repeat the process. If you get any excess on the windshield, remove it with nail polish or lacquer thinner. If you have a small pit left, use clear fingernail polish to fill it.

To repair a long crack, you will need to drill a pinhole in the middle and at each end.

Fill the crack as you would a chip.

When you are done, use a rag and alcohol to clean up any excess. Once the resin dries, you will have a like-new windshield for a lot less. How cool is that?

How Old Is That New Tire?

When you shop for bananas, you buy the bruised, rotting ones, right? Of course, you don't. You go for the fresh ones unless you're making banana bread. When you shop for tires, you just might be buying ones that are the equivalent of bruised, rotting bananas. Unfortunately, unlike bananas, the tires may be bruised and rotting where you can't see such damage. That's because these seemingly new tires aren't new at all. Here's how you can tell how old that "new" tire really is.

Imprinted on all tires are a series of digits and letters called a Tire Identification Number (or the tire's serial number). It's these symbols that tell you where the tire was made, how big it is and when it was made—specifically identifying the week and the year of the tire's manufacturing.

Depending upon whether the tire was manufactured since the year 2000 or before, there are two sets of dig-

its and letters. For those manufactured in 2000 or later, the first three symbols will be the letters "DOT" in all instances. The remaining symbols will be a combination of letters and numbers. The entire series will look similar to this: DOT K6RY TBFM 4408. It's the last four numbers that you want to focus on. The week and the year of the tire's manufacture can be found in these four numbers. The first two digits indicate the week of assembly and the last two identify the year. If you see "4408" as the last four digits, that tire was made in the 44th week of the year 2008. If the last four digits are "1609," the tire was made in the 16th week of 2009.

For tires manufactured before 2000, you'll again have "DOT" and then a series of letters and numbers like this: DOT TB1C MJT

359. This time, it's the last three numbers that you want to check. Again, the first two digits of the last three indicate the week of assembly while the last number shows the year. If you see "359" at the end, the tire was made in the 35th week in 1999.

Armed with that information, what do you do? Well, you head out to your vehicle (or vehicles) and check the

ages of all your tires. If you've got one that's six years old or older, it's time to get a new one—even if it has low miles. As tires age, a degradation process takes place. Tire tread separation can result—the tread comes away from the tire in an instant—and an accident can occur even if the tire has low miles on it.

Of course, age isn't the only consideration when thinking

about your tires. Factors such as wear, maintenance, storage and weather are also important to take note of.

The good thing about older tires—as opposed to old fruit—is that you can return them for a refund up to a point. If you've got a tire that's six years old, you've got, to keep up with the fruit analogy, a lemon. If you bought it six years ago, you're out of luck

and need to buy a replacement right away. However, if you've got tires considerably older than the date you bought them on, you may be in luck. Take your receipt to the place you bought the tire from and see what they can do. Depending upon the tire's wear and the age discrepancy, you may get anywhere from a partial to a full discount on its replacement.

An alternative to pain at the pump

To ease the pain of gas prices, many consumers are looking at alternatives like hybrids and vehicles that run on vegetable oil. While the latter may not conjure up a pleasant image, it most certainly has helped drivers keep more money in their pocket.

Almost any vehicle that runs on diesel fuel can be converted to vegetable oil

for about \$1,000 to \$3,000. Known affectionately as grease cars, these vehicles have two tanks, one for diesel fuel and one for vegetable oil. The vehicles must start and stop on diesel fuel and will run on vegetable oil after it has heated up.

Restaurants generally donate the vegetable oil required, but in order for drivers to use it, they must take

great pain to filter it. Any old food particles and water must be eliminated from the oil. Generally, this involves letting the oil sit for several weeks, enabling the food particles and water to settle to the bottom. The oil is then heated and filtered. Filtering systems can be purchased or made from scratch.

In some places around the country, drivers can find veg-

etable oil at the pump. There are companies that actually manufacture the oil and sell it. The price per gallon can be high, but not nearly as high as regular gas. Drivers also don't have to fill up their tanks as frequently. Depending upon the size of the vehicle, drivers can get as much as 200 miles per gallon on vegetable oil.

Although beneficial, the alternative technology does present some problems. Conversion systems are not readily available for vehicles that run on traditional fuel, and purchasing a diesel vehicle can be difficult in some areas of the country due to emissions laws. The odor put off by vegetable oil can be offensive, and collecting, hauling and storing it can be difficult. Because vehicles cannot switch over to vegetable oil until it has heated up, drivers who go short distances may find the system ineffective.

Vehicles that run on vegetable oil are not for everyone. Do your homework before you make the switch and ensure it will be worth your money. In most cases, the money saved in fuel costs over the years will more than make up for the money spent on conversion. Moreover, the emissions will be far less, helping the environment.

Safety features in your car that you may not know about

• Rear cross traffic alerts that warn drivers if traffic is approaching from the left or right when the vehicle is in reverse

• Adaptive cruise control that maintains the speed set by the driver and a pre-set following distance

• Lane departure warnings that alert drivers if they drift into another lane when the

turn signal is not activated.

a car's best safety feature; no technology today will change that," Hersman said. "But these features can help mitigate errors before they result in deaths and injuries."





Ugh, what's that smell?

Have you ever gotten into your vehicle only to be taken aback by the smell that greeted you? Perhaps your son left his sweaty clothes from soccer practice in the back seat, or worse, stashed a bag of fast

food under the seat, which has now molded. Whatever the root of the problem, you removed it, inserted an air freshener in your car and drove with the windows down for the next few days. If you were lucky, the odor sub-

sided. If you weren't, read on for information concerning what you might do to eliminate the persisting odor. After removing the cause of the problem, you should clean your vehicle thoroughly. Wipe down all of the surfaces, using

cotton swabs to get into tight spaces. Clean the windows. Spray down any rubber carpet mats. Next, turn your attention to the carpet and upholstery. You may clean these by hand or rent a steam cleaner. If the odor is pungent, you may want to do the latter.

If the odor persists, you might want to look for a product that will neutralize it. Read and follow the manufacturer's instructions on the product. In most cases, you will probably spray the product onto the infected area and let it dry. Even with a thorough cleaning and the use of a neutralizing product, the odor may remain. Hopefully, it has grown more faint. To get rid of it completely, you may have to take more drastic measures like having the carpet replaced.

Nothing beats regularly cleaning your vehicle to prevent and remove offensive odors. You might also want to be careful about topping off fluids. Many a mechanic has reported finding spilled fluids

or the wrong fluids used entirely. Both of these can lead to odors, and in some cases, major damage.

Do your best to keep your ve-

hicle free of odors. Remove trash daily, clean the interior weekly and work to eliminate odors the minute they occur.



Slow down and save

The snow and ice have melted, the roads are clear and spring is here. Winter driving can be dangerous and very frustrating. Going to the store or getting to work during the winter takes planning. You have to allow for road conditions, traffic and the stress of taking to the ice roads. Once spring arrives, most people just want to relax behind the wheel and enjoy the open road. But there is something else to consider that you might not have thought about during the winter months-gas.

Getting from place to place in the winter is enough to occupy your mind, but once the roads are clear, you want to drive farther and faster, and that means using more gas. Here are a few ways to save on gas as you spend more time in your vehicle.

Slow down and save. The faster you go, the fewer miles you will get to the gallon. Driving over 60 mph will decrease your gas mileage. It has been estimated that every 5 mph over 60 you drive, you are going to consume more fuel. Besides how fast you are driving, consider HOW you are driving. If you rapidly accelerate or brake, you are using more gas and will lower your mileage by more than 30%.

Keep the pressure under control. Correct tire pressure is crucial to good gas mileage. Make sure that your tires are properly inflated. The correct PSI (pounds per square inch) can be found on the tire, on the sticker on the door or in your owner's manual.

Change your oil regularly. The classic rule of thumb is to change your oil every three months or 3,000 miles. This rule is a source of great debate. The point at which oil breaks down has improved over the years and many experts feel today's oil lasts longer. The best way to judge when your oil needs to be changed is by consulting the vehicle owner's manual.

Pace yourself. If you do a lot of highway driving, use your cruise control. This will allow you to keep a constant rate of speed and improve your gas mileage.

Lighten your load. During the winter months, you may have put bags of salt or sand in your trunk for added weight and traction. Now is the time to get rid of them. A lighter vehicle is a more fuel-efficient vehicle. Drag on your vehicle decreases its efficiency by 2%. Get rid of any nonessential items in your car and save some money on gas.

Spring is the time to shake off the cold of winter and enjoy the warmer weather. Just remember it may be warmer outside, but gas prices are still the same.


